Tactical Facilitator is defined as a person responsible for training Tactical Operators in any capacity.

Tactical Operator is defined as military, law enforcement, fire/rescue, first responders, and EMS operators sworn to protect their country and/or community in high-risk situations which demand dynamic levels of strength, speed, power, stamina and agility. The Tactical Operator is both aerobically fit (performing longer, harder, and recovering faster) and anaerobically fit (executing intense and explosive skills within a short period of time).
